Be Considerate, Do Your Best, and Have Fun

Those are the three goals that Japhet Middle Schoolers (5th through 8th) strive to reach during their annual September retreat to the Leelanau Outdoor Center in northern Michigan.

"If you're considerate and strive to do your best, the third goal is automatic," says a sixthgrader.

Every year at LOC, teachers see new friendships form, students in all four grades encourage each other without hesitation, and each person gently pushed outside what he or she finds "comfortable" ... thereby making that circle of comfort a little bit bigger. Leelanau's beautiful outdoor setting and activities facilitate a spirit of cooperation, unity, and focused academic learning.

The camping trip always includes a special hike, during which the lead counselor imparts lessons that relate to school and life. This year's lessons were:

- 1. The Lesson of the Grapevine a particular species of grapevine is invasive to Michigan, and along the trail it was holding up a partially felled tree, still alive. "Sometimes we need to rely on those who would otherwise annoy us," the counselor shared.
- 2. The Lesson of the False Summit sometimes we think we've reached our goal, only to realize we have more to go. A seventh-grade student connected it to school in this humorous way, "It's like thinking you've finished a test, and then you realize the test paper is a two-sider."
- 3. The Lesson of the Coyote Sometimes you've "just gotta howl."

The LOC trip makes a lasting impression, and it is discussed all year long among students and teachers.

Michigan, Brazil, and Beyond Social Studies Fair and Guest Day

Mark your calendars! Just around the bend is Japhet School's annual Social Studies Fair and Guest Day, which takes place **Friday, November 21, from 10:00 AM to 12:00 PM**.

On this special day, students will share what they've learned about Michigan, the Brazilian Rainforest, South American countries, and the Constitution and its amendments.

Preschool students are learning about harvest. Students will have activities to share with guests like wheat grinding, pumpkin pounding, and spicy orange playdough. Current art projects will be on display, and students will share homemade "stone soup."

Kindergarten students are learning all about Michigan. They will have a Michigan diorama to share that they built together, homemade applesauce, and Michigan books to read together. Their diorama will be an Eastern Market that will show produce, furniture, animals and vehicles from Michigan. Kindergarten families will have much to do with their young Michiganians!

Primary Class students have been learning about the Brazilian rainforest, and they will teach guests about that rainforest. We can look forward to presentations about the layers of the rainforest, the animals that live there, Brazilian people, geography, and a special Brazilian food dish to share with guests.

Middle Class will transform into a Living Museum of Michigan. Building on what students learn in Kindergarten, Middle Class students will delve into the details of Michigan's British and French history, lumber industry, mining, the Macinac Bridge, Native American culture, natural resources, and more. Students will share this information in a variety of ways.

Intermediate Class students will apply their understanding of the Five Themes of Geography – Location, Place, Human Interaction with the Environment, Movement, and Regions – to a South or Central American country. Then, they will take this knowledge and use it to write a creative story in which they become a person living in that country. Look forward to meeting these people on Social Studies Fair Day and learn what it's like to be a Central or South American.

Upper Class students will be doing a panel discussion about whether the Constitution is a proslavery or pro-liberty document. Upper Class is examining the amendments as well, and we look forward to their analysis as a panel of experts.

If you have attended Social Studies Fair in the past, you will notice a change in this year's venue. Social Studies Fair has become so popular, that we have been challenged to provide ample space for our students' presentations as well as a luncheon for 200 people. This year, we have decided to forego the luncheon, in order to provide more space for sharing and listening.
