"Core Classes" refer to those subjects considered most important to a child's education: reading, math, language arts, science, and social studies. A well rounded student, however, also studies fine and performing arts, participates in physical activity, stays current with technology, explores a foreign language, and learns life skills such as cooking. We call these "Special Classes," and Japhet specialists purposefully integrate their subjects with what students are learning in core classes. This creates a broader understanding of the subject and cultivates excitement to learn.

Japhet educators are thinking innovatively! Innovation involves thinking differently, expanding perspectives, and rethinking assumptions. In the school, this is evident when Preschoolers use technology to explore the ocean, Intermediate students discuss a current event through Wikispaces, or Middle Class students create a video commercial to demonstrate their knowledge of simple machines. Outside of the school, the use of a quick-response (QR) code in our print advertising engages the mobile market.

Japhet students are becoming inventors! They are thinking innovatively as they solve problems – using initiative and industry to create new and different solutions. They are recording ideas in logbooks, conducting research, and designing models.

Ann Nicholson and Pat Tibbetts HONORED AS DISTINGUISHED VOLUNTEERS

“Intuitive.” This word describes Japhet trustee Ann Nicholson, whose 35 years in community affairs have had a positive impact on education. Pat Tibbetts, who served Japhet as a parent, teacher, Head of School, and trustee, was singularly defined as “Gracious.” Nicholson and Tibbetts were both honored as Distinguished Volunteers at the 20th Annual National Philanthropy Day dinner that took place in November.

Ann Nicholson’s advocacy for education is honored in the community at large. In addition to serving on Japhet’s board, she serves on the board of Oakland University, where she supports scholarship and has been at the forefront of the university’s launch of a medical school. For Japhet, her wisdom and vast experience in education have lent an intuitive voice to the board. “Her insight has been a valuable asset,” says Cathy Mohan, “for which Japhet is truly grateful.”

Under Pat’s leadership, Japhet became the nation’s first independent – and Michigan’s very first – school to be named a National School of Character. She also implemented Michigan’s State Schools of Character program. As of 2012 there are 12 Michigan schools that have been so awarded, and more Michigan schools are initiating active character programs each year. “Exemplifying the qualities of initiative and diplomacy, Pat is an effective advocate who graciously enacts positive change in schools,” says Mohan.

Tori is a senior at Ithaca College, studying cinematography and film. Perry is the writer and director of a new film: *Zug*. A senior at the University of Michigan, he has been the recipient of six Hopwood Awards for Poetry, Fiction and Screenwriting. Perry's film is set in Detroit, a city filled with myths and urban legends. *Zug* is the story of two boys from the outskirts of Detroit forced to straddle the boundary between city and suburbs. Upon a dare from their classmates, they resolve to sneak inside the mysterious Zug Island. "The film is a coming-of-age story that explores the problematic images and narratives about Detroit by following two boys on a quest for their own identity," writes Perry. "Through Donovan's eyes, Detroit becomes a character to be explored – and challenged. Ultimately *Zug* is meant to create a new narrative for the city, one that explores its stereotypes and myths and refutes them." *Zug* is slated to debut in Ann Arbor in mid-April.
