INNOVATE! Keeping learning alive, fresh, and creative

When asked to define "innovation in the classroom," some might jump to the use of new gadgetry, virtual classrooms, or Google Hangouts. But true innovation is much more than that. "It's looking at the ways we're teaching and changing them up," says Janet Andersen, Primary Class teacher and a veteran staffer of 30+ years. "It's making learning alive and personal, helping students become self-aware as learners, and teaching them how to be alert to the needs of others, too. Students learn differently. We can reach all students when we use innovative teaching."

"Innovation can be as simple as tailoring your lessons to the 'personality' of the class," says Liz Grunow, Middle Class teacher and one of two curriculum coordinators. "It is reinventing our lessons each year -- even though we're teaching the same concepts -- based on what will resonate with that class of students. Innovation is 'newness,' it doesn't need to be techy or expensive."

Mrs. Grunow shares an example of an early American Settlers unit. "We talked about how Pilgrims built one large house for everyone to live in while they worked together to create a small town," she says. "Students didn't understand the problems that might involve. So we built our own general house in our classroom and worked and had recess inside of it for a week. The challenges involved in building our structure and giving one another personal space helped illustrate this part of Pilgrim life better than any video or reading selection." Students also

immensely enjoyed having the structure to do regular activities in. It brought excitement to their everyday learning by working in a different space.

Carrie Huber, Preschool teacher, sees innovation as a gateway to creativity. "Students in an innovative teaching environment enjoy learning because they are allowed to explore and learn on their own," she says. Japhet School's early childhood classrooms emphasize play, open centers, and student-led discovery. The primary outcome is that children discover the joy of learning, setting them up for a successful formal education. Mrs. Huber especially loves the excitement of STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts, and math) and is leading a STEAM Camp for children in preschool through

- · "Innovation in education involves constant collaboration with colleagues -- a total last-minute redo of a teacher's lesson plans because there was something else out there that he or she had to try, a change in the direction of a class because the students are driving the instruction."
- "Innovation in education happens when educators ask, 'How can I make this real, relevant, interesting, student-centric and personalized?""
- "Innovation in education is about more than just technology. It's about how you can use technology to empower students to become lifelong learners who are agents of change."

Q: What led you to choose Japhet for your children?

Q: You've been connected to Japhet School for a very long time and been a part of some important transitions. What progress have you seen?

A: Ann "Getting our own building ... Japhet School is definitely visible in the community now! More people know the school when I tell them our sons went to Japhet."

Q: You began as Hands of Hope donors, and now give at the "Creating Dreams" level. You've also participated in Trustee Match campaigns and the Lasting Legacy campaign. Why do you choose to give at this level?

A: Frank "We see what a difference Japhet makes in a child's life. It is important that we give as many children as we can the chance to have that. INNOVATE!

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2nd grade at Japhet this summer.

Innovative teaching reaches across the curriculum. Art teacher Marti Minard, Spanish teacher Nancy Flores, and physical education teacher Sam Herrick all enjoy employing innovative teaching strategies and lessons into their classes as a benefit to students.

"Art class offers daily opportunities to be innovative," Ms. Minard says. "Ideas from the past and present spur imagination. Students use thrift, respect for the environment, and innovation to re-use materials in art." She explains a recent sculpture unit in which students created unique sculptural characters using dish detergent bottles and old wooden spoons.

Sra. Flores employs a strategy called Total Physical Response to help students retain their new language skills and make it fun. She leads physical movements connected to verbal input. The process mimics the way that infants learn their first language, and it reduces student inhibitions and lowers stress. She also enjoys integrating Spanish with other school subjects, like math. "Students are eager to show how they can state a mathematical answer using their Spanish," she says.

Mr. Herrick is ardent about helping students live healthy, balanced lives emotionally and physically, and part of that approach is teaching students different relaxation techniques and yoga, a regular part of his classes. "This helps calm stress and anxiety," he says. When students are relaxed, they are free to be their natural, joyful selves in the classroom.

Up in Middle School, where independence and reliability are critical as students prepare for high school, math and science teacher Brenda Gaunt explains how she is working with students on what she calls 'The Science of Organization.' She employs specific tools with students, works with them individually, and communicates with parents about how they can help support their children's productive habits. Mrs. Gaunt believes student growth lies in innovative, open-minded thinking by all involved. "When changes are put into place, everyone needs to be of the mindset that we are working hard to help students succeed," she says. "Be open to re-evaluating as necessary and embrace changes that are made after re-evaluation."

Technology, while not the crux of innovation, certainly does have its place. Mrs. Andersen is buoyed by technology that helps students write. "They may have a great idea, but some do not yet have the skills to physically write it on paper," she says, and technology -- such as verbal recognition software and auto-population of words -- "helps students feel capable and successful as writers. They're doing what their classmates are doing, just in a different way."

"Innovation adds a 'freshness' to the classroom," says Penny Witt, Japhet's Accounting Manager. Mrs. Witt also is a current parent who, as an employee, has the opportunity to see her child learning in class every day. "Students are excited and engaged. I see Japhet teachers doing this successfully. But we can always improve ... and INNOVATE."
