"Coming in on their own has really helped Preschoolers develop independence. No long good-byes or good-bye tears. They come in, put their things away themselves, and join the classroom right away! It's made such a difference ... I hope in some way to continue it." *Carrie Huber, Preschool teacher*

"I was against having desks in Kindergarten at first, but they quickly became a wonderful part of our classroom. Students enjoyed having their own spaces and being organized. 

BE GRATEFUL





GIVING STORIES

Sharon and Jay Schmitt



Sharon and Jay Schmitt have been long-time donors and friends of Japhet School. In May 2020 Jay passed on, and he is deeply missed by all who knew him. Our next golf outing, which we hope to have in August, will be named after Jay to honor him and his many years of service to Japhet as a trustee and board treasurer. An avid golfer, Jay was always the first to reserve his foursome and recruit one or two more teams! His wife Sharon spent

some time with us to share more about the 'whole person' of Jay Schmitt and why the couple has been dedicated to Japhet School for more than 25 years.

Jay and Sharon have four children: two sons and two daughters. They have 12 grandchildren and another on the way. While they had heard of Japhet School, their daughter Julie Haugan taught here in the 1990s, and that is when they realized the importance of the school's mission and decided to become involved. First they were donors, then Jay became a trustee—a position he held until he passed, taking only one year off in between several 6-year terms to follow Japhet's by-laws.

"Jay deeply valued education," said Sharon. She explained that while they were raising their four children, Jay worked for Detroit Edison in the daytime, went to Wayne State University at night, and spent the weekends studying to get two master's degrees in electrical engineering and in finance. "He was of little help at home during those early days!" Sharon shared with a laugh. "But his education became a resource he drew upon to help others, and when he saw Julie working for Japhet and the character qualities she also taught, that really spoke to him. We saw a place where children were being educated not only academically but also ethically and morally. We decided we wanted to be involved and support Japhet School in any way we could."

Helping to ensure the financial health of Japhet School was Jay's priority. Not only have he and Sharon donated generously, Jay also shared his expertise as a volunteer member of our Finance Committee, Development Committee, and Investment Oversight Committee. A stalwart, conservative, and frugal person, Jay's passion for thrift is remembered by all who served alongside him.

Sharon joined Jay in service to Japhet School by hosting board retreats and cooking for Japhet School volunteers who visited their home. "These people deserve something special,' Jay would tell me, and I was happy to provide," Sharon said.

Sharon supported home life and worked as a paraprofessional for Waterford Public Schools for 22 years, and Jay worked for Detroit Edison for 38 years. After 'retiring' from Detroit Edison he continued to work for DE as a contractor, then he worked another three years for a startup, the Michigan Electric Transmission Company. After his work with METC Jay fully retired.

Japhet School wasn't Jay's only charitable endeavor as a retiree—far from it. He also served his church, and he served in prison ministry, writing to incarcerated men and visiting prisons in Marquette, Saginaw, and Midland. He also met with former prisoners upon their release and continued to give them support financially and emotionally. "We embraced them," said Sharon. "So many of these young men have nobody ... absolutely nobody. While in prison some of them wouldn't even be given a toothbrush." She and Jay ensured they had what they needed and more. "We let them know they are loved and cared for," Sharon said, and it is a ministry that she plans to continue on her own.

Deciding to name our next Fore the Kids Golf Outing after Jay was an easy decision. Jay was a golfing enthusiast, and uniquely athletic as a person permanently affected by polio in his left leg. "When he was young he was told he would never participate in sports or even climb stairs," said Sharon, "but he played softball and was the pitcher. He played hockey and was the goalie. He learned to water ski on one ski. And in high school he learned to golf." It's a sport he enjoyed for the rest of his life.
